#### The 1973 Yom Kippur War

Colonel Tony Malkin will be taking us through the conflict based on his intimate knowledge of the area gained from living there for 5 years while establishing a Leadership Academy for the Palestinian Security Forces in Jericho in close cooperation with the Israeli military authorities. He has guided several UK Ministry of Defence battlefield tours to the area and will be guiding 'The Birth of Modern Israel' Cultural Experience tour to the area in November. His insights will make for a fascinating talk.


# Wednesday 23rd October

Our October talk will be on "The Battle of Balaclava" with our Joint Chairman, <u>Colonel Bob Kershaw</u>. Topically, the talk is just two days prior to the 165<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the famous cavalry charge.

The charge of the Light Brigade, during the Battle of Balaclava on 25 October 1854, is one of the most famous military exploits during the Crimean War of 1854-55. The war was truly a Victorian epic, pitting the British and French armies, allied for the first time after many years of enmity, against the might of Russia. Just two days before the 165th anniversary, historian Bob Kershaw presents a fascinating talk based upon his recent book in which he provides step-by-step analysis of the course of the charge, the various personalities and compares the reality with Tennyson's famous poem and the 1968 film.

# Ron-Society Military History News:

#### New Agincourt museum to dispel myths

For those of us that attended Professor Anne Curry's revealing talk in June, the truths of the Battle of Agincourt still resound. As well as recounting the myths and presenting the realities of Henry V's force and the events of the battlefield, Prof. Curry also told us about the new exhibition to open in the town of Azincourt. This new exposition will open at the Centre Historique Médiévalin Azincourt today (17<sup>th</sup> September). Read more

### Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact papers released 80 years on

With eight decades having passed, Moscow has declassified a number of top-secret pre-war documents including those relating to the infamous Nazi-Soviet pact that declared their non-aggression towards each other and divided Polish and Baltic lands. A key letter released in the papers is a 31-page document written by Red Army Chief of General Staff Boris Shaposhnikov in which he conveys fear of the Soviet Union facing a war on two fronts, such as Germany was also seeking to avoid. Some commentators are drawing parallels between the pre-war Soviet fear of western aggression and President Putin's modern-day pre-emptive actions to combat western influence in Ukraine, for example. #### 'Military theatre' of the Dambusters raid boosted British morale and standing

Sir Max Hasting's latest book turns its attention to 617 Squadron in 'Chastise: The Dambusters Story 1943'. The Lancaster raid on the night of 16<sup>th</sup>/17<sup>th</sup> May 1943 struck the Möhne and Eder dams in the Ruhr Valley and Wing Commander Guy Gibson entered RAF history. However, in addition to the 53 airmen lost, around 1,300 German civilians and prisoners of war died. Additionally, some question the raid's success, as the Sorpe dam was not attacked and not attacking the Möhne and Eder dams when under-repair ahead of the autumn rains were missed opportunities. For Sir Max, the real significance of the raid was to boost faltering British morale and reinvigorate American and Russian faith in their embattled ally. Read more

#### 131 nuclear weapons and 60-mile/day advance to conquer France

With pre-war Soviet documents being released in August, some 1960s Warsaw Pact war plans resurfaced too. Discovered in Czechoslovakia, the plans envisaged the Soviet Eighth Guards Army breaking through on the northern flank, the Czech First and Fourth Armies pushing through Bavaria to the Franco-German border and the Hungarians attacking on the southern flank. The seven-day attack would require a speed-of-advance totalling 60 miles per day; more than the Afrika Korps' rapid 350-mile burst in ten days in June 1942. However, the Soviets planned to execute such a swift advance by nullifying NATO defences with 131 nuclear weapons. The battle plans were dated 1964, by which time the French Air Force carried nuclear weapons so, although the Soviets envisaged an initial parity in terms of force size, fortunately the threat of mutually assured destruction (MAD) was never realised. #### The 'short war' illusion

In his latest book, Boston University's Cathal J. Nolan declares that there is no such thing as a decisive battle or war-winning 'genius general'. "In fact, from at least the 17th century, most wars fought among major powers were not won and lost in a decisive battle led by genius generals directing tactical movements. They were long contests of endurance of fire and starvation, of marching armies ravaging the countryside, of months' and even years' long sieges of towns and cities. Even if there are geniuses present at a battle, war is too complex for even genius to control." This new text urges historians not to elevate tactical victories by ignoring their significance in the war's context. Read more
